ENHANCED HEALTH IN CARE HOMES

We welcome the refreshed Enhanced Health in Care Homes (EHCH) framework published by NHS England at the end of November 2023 and are delighted to have contributed to the latest update.

The Enhanced Health in Care Homes (EHCH) framework is for primary care networks (PCNs) and providers and commissioners of community health and social care services. It guides the commissioning of and delivery arrangements for health and social care services in collaboration with care homes, so that the entire system works together to provide personalised care, improve outcomes and promote independence for people living in care. Topics within the guidance range from nutrition to skin and wound care and leg and foot ulcer care.

Rachael Lee, NWCSP Acting Programme Manager, commented, "The Enhanced Health in Care Homes framework is essential reading for those working in or to support care homes and we were pleased to provide our expertise in leg and foot ulcer and pressure ulcer care. We are thrilled that the framework signposts care homes to the NWCSP guidance for leg and foot ulcers which will help to ensure patients receive best practice care and hope our more recently published pressure ulcer care guidance will also be useful."




SUPPORTED SELF-CARE: TAKING A PHOTO OF YOUR WOUND POSTERS

PRESSURE ULCER DATA COLLECTION

The NWCSP has released new guidance for secondary care trusts on using the Model Health System for pressure ulcer data collection. This system is designed to offer a standardised approach, reducing variation and improving national data accuracy.

Back in 2020 and 2021, the NWCSP and National Stop the Pressure Programme jointly agreed to use existing national data sets as the data source for reporting pressure ulcer prevalence and incidence. This results in a move away from auditing and similar practices that take clinicians away from time spent with patients and towards the collection of data via coded clinical records made at the time of care.

Guidance includes a briefing document and Model Hospital how-to guide, which are available on <u>the NWCSP website.</u>

STOP THE PRESSURE

The NWCSP joined forces with the Society of Tissue Viability and all four nations to create and deliver the campaign for Stop the Pressure Week 2023.

We provided £5,000 for the campaign, which was matched by the Society of Tissue Viability and contributed to the creation of multiple resources including study days, webinars, quizzes, videos and a series of documents. View these resources through <u>the NWCSP website.</u>
